MAJOR EMPIRES AND STATES

IN AFRICA, KINGDOMS SUCH AS MALI AND GREAT ZIMBABWE THRIVED THROUGH CONTROL OF GOLD RESOURCES AND TRADE ROUTES. EUROPE EXPERIENCED FEUDALISM, THE CRUSADES, AND THE BEGINNINGS OF URBAN REVIVAL.

TRADE NETWORKS AND CULTURAL DIFFUSION

THE SILK ROADS, INDIAN OCEAN TRADE, AND TRANS-SAHARAN ROUTES EXPANDED FURTHER, CONNECTING DIVERSE REGIONS WITH UNPRECEDENTED INTENSITY.
